Within these 5 short years, our direct 'hands on' flourishing Education Support Programs have overwhelmingly exceeded our projected accomplished expectations and has been a positive impact on student's lives. From the 3 original poor rural schools supported by Indigo Threads, we now provide a variety of Programs to 16 schools, assisting in meeting the educational needs of more then 3,000 students. #### AN INNOVATIVE TEACHING SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

In order to address the critical shortage of teachers in extreme remote rural areas, Indigo Threads has joined the Education Department's innovative Program with a commitment of 4 additional 2010-2011 teaching scholarships after interning the first year at their remote village school. Their yearly education expenses to include tuition, board and room are covered with a \$500.00 donation; one of the world's best bargains. Consider giving a young Laotian person a future as a teacher.

Indigo Threads 2009-2010 scholarships were awarded to 3 bright, needy students to the Pakse Teacher's Training College for the 3-year secondary school teacher training Program. With the generous support of Phonexay Singharatsavong (USA) in cooperation with Indigo Threads, Mr. Anouvan (L), Miss Leo and Mr. Somsay (R) have an opportunity they would not otherwise have with a promising future as teachers, eventually supporting educational needs in their rural villages. Since 2006, Indigo Threads Teacher Training Scholarship Program has provided one teacher yearly to the Lao Ministry of Education. All candidates have been selected from the Pakse Ethnic Boarding High School.

### 8-YEAR OLD SURVIVES COBRA SNAKE BITE

Regrettably, deadly snake bites are prevalent in rural Laos regions.

While playing with friends in his village, a cobra snake found Noi. the youngest of 7 children. Noi with his poor parents at his side, has been at the Army Hospital for four months, after 2 leg amputations and suffering a heart attack as a result of the bite. Noi has beaten the odds and will survive . . .with a debilitating handicap. Indigo Threads has made a donation to help Noi's family and provided him with learning activities during his hospital stay while honoring him with a medal for his bravery. Understandably, photos were not allowed at the Army Hospital.

## 2nd ANNUAL SCHOOL HEALTH FAIR

Indigo Threads in cooperation with the District Education and Health Service Departments, presented our second annual expanded Student School Health Check Up Program in February 2010. Doctors and nurses preformed a general check up on each student, while Indigo Threads took the opportunity to present a Lao Healthy Food Choice demonstration.

For more serious ailments, Indigo Threads provided prescriptions. The 4day event encompassed 6 primary schools with 700 students and teachers participating. CBF Pharma Co., a Pakse, Laos drug manufacturer, 'stepped up to the plate' with a donation of a gener-

ous quantity of vitamins for each students to take home. We are grateful for their support and look forward to working with them in the near future. Indigo Threads intent is to provide preliminary health reports for the student's parents, as there is no health care available to

### Reading/Active Learning Program



The 2009-2010 school year's primary focus has been our Primary School Reading/Active Learning Program in cooperation with the District Education Department.

Each week one school is selected with 3 classes taught by Indigo Threads Director and staff.

With the generous support of the Lao Room to Read Organization and Suzanne Visor (USA), primary school students in all levels have an exciting variety of books to read. While half of the classes are devoted to reading, storytelling, acting out stories and presenting traditional Lao folktales, Indigo Thread takes this opportunity to teach simple English words, introduce geouphic mans creative draw

graphic maps, creative drawing, introduce simple science illustrations, exercise and environment issues.

School Supervisors and teacher are extremely enthusiastic about this Program as it gives their students opportunities that are not normally available. Fourteen hundred students in 13 primary schools have participated . . . and counting.
